EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2014/15 the activities of the Strategies for Hope Trust were marked by the continued expansion of the Called to Care initiative and the contraction of some other, long-standing projects.

There were four particularly significant developments in the Called to Care initiative, namely:

- O A 166% increase in the number of copies of Called to Care materials produced compared with the previous year.
- A 41% increase in the number of copies of Called to Care materials distributed compared with the previous year.
- O The production of editions of two Called to Care workbooks in Nepali, and one each in Burmese and French¹. The Nepali editions of Called to Care no. 8 (*My Life: Starting Now*) and no. 10 (*Parenting: a Journey of Love*) break new ground in that they include excerpts not only from the Bible, but also from the three other main religious faiths Hinduism, Buddhism and Islam in Nepal.
- A 156% increase in the number of people who participated in Called to Care training workshops, compared with the previous year. A total of 65 such workshops were organised (22 funded by the SFH Trust, and 43 directly funded by donors), attended by 1,085 church and community leaders.

All these achievements were due, in large part, to the initiative and commitment of our partner organisations in sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia, who have contributed enormously to the SFH project.


Meanwhile, the quantities of *Stepping Stones* materials and SFH DVDs declined sharply, mainly because the funds to support the reprinting and free distribution of these materials were completely spent at the end of the previous year.

The year 2014/15 also marked 20 years of extremely productive collaboration with Alice Welbourn, author of the *Stepping Stones* training package and Director of the Salamander Trust. From April 2015, *Stepping Stones* materials will be published by Practical Action Publishing and the Salamander Trust.

Between December 1989, when the first Strategies for Hope materials were published, and 31 March 2015, a total of 1,239,372 copies of SFH materials were produced: 1,181,503 books and training manuals, and 57,869 videos and DVDs. Approximately 86% of these materials have been distributed in sub-Saharan Africa.

Distribution of hard copies of Strategies for Hope materials is scheduled to finish on 30 September 2015. However, all 10 Called to Care workbooks (in English, French, Portuguese and Swahili) will be available for free downloading from the Strategies for Hope website (www.stratshope.org) until at least December 2016.

¹ The French edition of Called to Care book no. 10 was printed in April 2015. This was funded separately from Phase 7 of the Called to Care project.

To help sustain the impact of the Called to Care workbooks, the Strategies for Hope management team will provide technical and administrative support to a small number of selected partner organisations wishing to organise training workshops or to produce editions of Called to Care workbooks in languages other than English. This will be done, on a voluntary basis, until 31 December 2016.

None of the work carried out by the Strategies for Hope Trust and our partners would have been possible without the generous support of several donor organisations. The main donors to the Strategies for Hope Trust in 2014/15 were CAFOD, Hilfe für Brüder, ICCO/Kerk in Actie, the Maurice and Hilda Laing Charitable Trust, Misereor, missio Aachen, the Salamander Trust, the World Council of Churches and Zentrum Oekumene. Several individuals also made contributions.

In addition, Bread for the World and Misereor provided financial support directly to Strategies for Hope partners in Kenya, Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe for Called to Care training workshops and for the production of Called to Care workbooks in languages other than English. CAFOD, Catholic Relief Services and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America provided financial support for local language editions of Called to Care workbooks in Myanmar and Nepal. Even with a budget that fell well below the original target figure, it was thus possible to make substantial progress towards achieving the objectives of the Called to Care project.

This Annual Review will be the last to cover a full 12 months of Strategies for Hope activities in their present form. It is expected that, after September 2015, there will be no further expenditure on the production, reprinting and distribution of SFH materials, or on Called to Care training workshops. The Annual Review for 2015/16 will therefore include an overview of the whole 26 years of the Strategies for Hope project: the materials produced, the issues addressed, the partners with whom we have worked and the impact of the project – both in the past and in the future.

1. CALLED TO CARE TRAINING WORKSHOPS

1.1 Background

The purpose of the Called to Care training workshops, which began in 2012, is to enable churches, community groups and NGOs to use the materials more effectively. Each workshop brings together at least 10 church and/or community leaders for a two-day, non-residential training course, using one or two Called to Care workbooks, facilitated by two or more people.

The SFH Trust provides £240 to cover all or most of the costs involved: the main expenditure is for meals, snacks, drinks and travel expenses for the participants and the facilitators. Several churches, faith-based organisations and community groups have mobilised some funds locally to increase the number of participants. Each participant is provided with a copy of the Called to Care workbook(s) used during the the workshop.

Called to Care workshops have been organised by a wide range of church denominations, including Anglicans, Catholics, Evangelical, Methodist, Pentecostal and Reformed churches; and also by ecumenical groups, faith-based organisations, secular NGOs and one Muslim organisation.

In 2014/15 a total of 65 Called to Care workshops were organised: 22 funded by SFHT and 43 where organisations obtained funds directly from donors.

1.2 Workshops funded by SFH Trust

A total of 316 church and community (172 women; 144 men) attended the 22 Called to Care training workshops funded by the SFH Trust (see Table 1a).

These workshops were held in 9 African countries: Malawi (7), Togo (4), Kenya (3), Zimbabwe (2), the Democratic Republic of Congo (2), Cameroon (1), Mozambique (1), Rwanda (1) and Zambia (1). The language breakdown of the materials used was as follows: English (13), French (7), Portuguese (1) and Swahili (1). However, even in workshops using English or French workbooks, much of the discussion was held in one or more African vernacular languages.

1.3 Workshops funded directly by donors

Five partner organisations in Kenya, Malawi and Zambia received direct financial support from two German church agencies – Misereor and Brot für die Welt – to run 43 Called to Care training workshops. Attended by 769 church and community leaders (402 women; 367 men), these workshops used only English language Called to Care workbooks. The SFH Trust provided the partner organisations concerned with technical support in drafting their grant applications, and also in planning and reporting on their activities (see Table 1b).

1.4 Total workshop participants

The total number of church and community leaders attending Called to Care workshops funded either by the SFH Trust or directly by donor organisations in 2014/15 was 1,085. For details on Called to Care workshops conducted from August 2012 to March 2014, please see Appendix A.

1.5 Feedback

In Zimbabwe, **Pastor Petros Karekera from the Methodist Church** organised a workshop attended by 18 people, including pastors and leaders of women's groups, youth movements and men's fellowships. The workshop used Called to Care no. 7, *Call to Me: How the Bible Speaks in the Age of AIDS*. Afterwards some of the participants commented:

When I heard that it would be a two-day workshop, I wondered what would require so much time, what exactly we would be doing for two full days. But after attending the first

day I had to cancel all my appointments for the next day so that I would not miss Day Two.

The book's lesson objectives, exercises, Bible studies, pictures, illustrations and details in the boxes make one's job in lesson preparation simple. I liked all that. I particularly liked the timeguides for the lessons and activities. I will use the book in our church.

I liked the fact that the programme was not packed too much but was very flexible, allowing times for breaks, breathers and refreshments." Some participants, however, thought the workshop was too short. According to one participant, "The workshop needs more than two days. It would need four or five days."

In Malawi, with financial support from Misereor, **Tony Khanyepa from the Youth Activists Initiative Organisation** organised 14 Called to Care training workshops for 140 participants, half of whom used book no. 8, *My Life – Starting Now*, and the other half used no. 10, *Parenting: a Journey of Love*. Afterwards one of the youth participants commented:

This training has been inspiring in the way the information was delivered, as it blended well with Bible verses. It created more talking points than just the usual lecturing we had in other training workshops. The facilitators were flexible, and took pains to translate the contents and to deliver it with precision. They were engaging and interacting while facilitating. We wish we had more of these trainings in our communities because we strongly believe they could change the way of thinking among young people who are indulging in alcohol and drugs.

One of the child caregiver participants said:

The training was a revelation of hidden knowledge. It's like a treasure trove that has just been discovered, and now we are able to understand the complexity of parenting in the context of modern society. This is going to change the ways we treat children and deal with the challenges facing us all. But these Called to Care books should be in Chichewa because most parents don't understand English.

In Togo, Hermann Kodjo Sodokin, leader of the Association des jeunes unis pour le développement, reported: After this workshop many participants changed their behaviour towards people they were discriminating against. They came to see that people with AIDS are our brothers and sisters, parents and friends. We should be supporting them and also orphans, widows and widowers. It's also time that we talked about sex to our children and let them know about the dangers and how to prevent illnesses. ... Before the workshop the participants thought that AIDS was something which only people who were not close to God could contract, but through the workshop they learned that anyone can get it.

1.6 Future Called to Care workshops

There is strong demand for many more Called to Care training workshops, but only a fairly small number can be funded from the funds available to the SFH Trust. However, the Trust is fostering and supporting funding partnerships between African churches and faith-based NGOs, on the one hand, and European donor agencies, on the other. In 2015/16, these partnerships are expected to fund Called to Care workshops training 1,140 people in Kenya and Malawi.



2.1.1: Called to Care

No new Called to Care titles were planned for 2014/15. However, three new titles were published. In May 2014, the Myanmar Catholic HIV/AIDS Network (MCHAN) published a Burmese edition of Called to Care Book no. 7, *Call to Me: How the Bible Speaks in the Age of AIDS* (1,000) copies), with financial support from Catholic Relief Services and CAFOD.

In Nepal, with direct financial support from the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America and administrative support from Strategies for Hope, a local NGO, Sakriya Sath, produced Nepali editions of Called to Care no. 8, *My Life - Starting Now* (2,000 copies) and of Called to Care no. 10, *Parenting: a Journey of Love* (3,000 copies).



2.1.2: Stepping Stones

In November 2014, in collaboration with the Salamander Trust and the Network for Stepping Stones Approaches, we published Stepping Stones for Peace and Prosperity, which was written by Alice Welbourn, Baron Oron and Germine Sebuwufu.

This manual is an adaptation of the *Stepping Stones* training manual for pastoral communities in the Karamoja region of northeastern Uganda, and is supported by the World Bank Logica Project, Tufts University and the Salamander Trust. The initial printrun was 140 copies of this 252-page manual.

As from April 1st, 2015, this book, along with all other Stepping Stones materials, will be available from the Salamander Trust and not from Strategies for Hope.



2.1.3: Called to Care materials in the pipeline

In response to an offer of funding from the World Council of Churches, we embarked on the production of *Être parent: un voyage d'amour,* the French edition of Called to Care workbook no. 10, *Parenting: a Journey of Love*. This was published in May 2015.

In Malawi, with funding from Bread for the World, a local church-based organisation, CARD, translated Called to Care book no. 9, *More and Better Food*, into the main national language, Chichewa. In Zimbabwe, with funding from Misereor, the DP Foundation translated the same workbook into Ndebele. These titles will be published in 2015/16.

2.2 Book reprints and video duplication

Reprints of SFH books totalled 10,185, compared with 6,440 in 2013/14. Some 10,060 copies of Called to Care workbooks were reprinted, along with 125 copies of the *Stepping Stones* and *Stepping Stones PLUS* manuals. A total of 130 copies of SFH videos were produced. 3. MARKETING AND DISTRIBUTION

3.1 Distribution by language

A total of of 17,173 SFH books and films was distributed in 2014/15, compared with 13,555 copies in 2013/14. Called to Care workbooks accounted for 96% of materials distributed. Compared with the past, a much smaller proportion (51.7%) of materials distributed were in English; more than one third (34.9%) were in the Asian languages of Nepali and Burmese (see Table 3a).

3.2 Distribution by region

Most (60.7%) SFH materials were distributed in sub-Saharan Africa, followed by Asia (35%). Usually about 85-90% are distributed in Africa, but this figure changed this year due to the books produced in Myanmar and Nepal (see Table 3b).

3.3 Decentralised distribution and co-publishing relationships

Some 35% of SFH materials were distributed by partner organisations - considerably more than in 2013/14, but similar in proportion to 2012/13 (see Table 3c below).

Some partners print a large number of copies, such as Sakriya Sath in Nepal, and MCHAN in Myanmar. Others produce enough copies for their own workshops, for example NYAKWEFNET (Nyakach Kwe Women Forum for Networking) in Kenya.

3.4 SFH distribution from the UK

SFH materials distributed from the UK totalled 11,060 copies, compared with 12,835 in the previous year. Sales accounted for 5.7% of copies distributed, compared with 6.3% in the previous year (see Table 3d).

At the end of 2014/15 there was a total of 18,097 addresses on the SFH database, compared with 18,143 in the previous year. Some 68% of addresses on our database are of organisations in sub-Saharan Africa, followed by 17% in Europe, 7% in Asia and 5% in Australia, New Zealand and North America (see Table 3f).

About 30% of the records include email addresses, both in Africa and the world as a whole, a percentage which has remained fairly static for a few years.

3.7 Marketing and Distribution Assistant

For the past 8 years we have had a student from Oxford Brookes University as an intern working on the marketing and distribution of SFH materials. Once again, this has been an excellent arrangement.

3.8 Stepping Stones training materials

Stepping Stones is a training package on gender, HIV and communication issues in communities. The original 240-page manual and 70-minute workshop DVD were developed in Uganda by Alice Welbourn, in collaboration with the Strategies for Hope Trust and Action Aid, between 1993 and 1995. These materials were joined in 2008 by the 27-minute Stepping Stones Revisited DVD and the 140-page Stepping Stones PLUS training manual, and in 2014 by the 252-page manual, Stepping Stones for Peace and Prosperity, which is designed to promote peace and prosperity through reducing conflict and violence, especially in pastoral communities.



The original *Stepping Stones* training manual has been translated into at least 25 languages, and has been used in a wide range of urban and rural settings. The Salamander Trust (www.salamandertrust.net) now coordinates a network of over 1,000 *Stepping Stones* users worldwide (www.steppingstonesfeedback.org).

Between 1995 and 2015, the Strategies for Hope Trust has been the publisher and the main distributor of the original editions of *Stepping Stones* in English, and also of the French editions. This has been a highly productive, collaborative arrangement involving several stakeholders, in particular, the author of *Stepping Stones*, Alice Welbourn, the Salamander Trust, the Strategies for Hope Trust and several thousand partner organisations – not only in sub-Saharan Africa but also in many other parts of the world, for example, in South Asia, Latin America and the Pacific.

By 31 March 2015, a total of 30,191 copies of the original *Stepping Stones* manual had been produced², and 1,350 copies of the *Stepping Stones PLUS* manual³. In addition, 9,598 copies of the *Stepping Stones* workshop video/DVD had been produced.

In September 2014, when the Series Editor and the Production and Office Manger of the SFH Trust announced their intention to retire in 2015, it became necessary for the Salamander Trust to identify an alternative publisher of the *Stepping Stones* package.

By April 2015, it was decided that Practical Action Publishing would publish the *Stepping Stones* manual and training DVD, and also an entirely new manual, *Stepping Stones with Children*. This event is now scheduled for April 2016.

As of 1 April 2015, all existing stocks of *Stepping Stones* materials became the property of the Salamander Trust, which will also publish the forthcoming *Stepping Stones with Children* training package.



3.9 L'Espoir est un pouvoir (Hope is Power)



We edited, reproduced and distributed 150 copies of this 27-minute film, in which a young Congolese woman, Angélique Machozi, describes how she found the courage to speak openly about her HIV-positive status to her family, her church congregation and the members of her family. The original film was produced by a small NGO in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Action Chrétienne contre le VIH/Sida, run by Angélique and her husband, Patrick. Angélique explains in the film how she and her husband, Patrick, were married in their local church, how they have had two HIVnegative children, and how they work with local church groups on HIV prevention, care and support. The film is available only in French.

3.10 Distribution since the beginning of SFH Trust

Between December 1989 and March 2015, a total of 1,226,669 copies of SFH materials are known to have been distributed by the SFH Trust and its partner organisations. These materials consisted of 1,170,020 books, manuals and CDs, and 56,649 DVDs and videos. For details – by languages and geographical distribution – please see Appendices C and D.

4. WEBSITE

Several new postings were added to the SFH website. All of these highlight the contributions of SFH partners in sub-Saharan Africa to the production, distribution and practical application of SFH materials. They include, for example, reports on Called to Care training workshops run by a Methodist Church congregation in Mozambique and by the Catholic Archdiocese of Mombasa in Kenya, and also the extraordinary work being done in the Democratic Republic of Congo by Angélique Machozi and her husband, Patrick Kisembo, who also produced the DVD, *L'Espoir est un pouvoir* (Hope is Power).



5. OTHER ACTIVITIES

During the past 12 years, the Strategies for Hope Trust has supported three charitable organisations in sub-Saharan Africa. The first of these is the Friends of Canon Gideon Foundation (FOCAGIFO), which runs the Hope Institute in Kampala, Uganda. Founded in 2003, the Institute has since trained over 1,000 young people from low-income families in vocational skills and life skills. In 2014/15 the Trust raised £1,800 from individual donors in the UK and was also instrumental in arranging additional financial support from outside the UK.

The second focus of the Trust's voluntary work is an HIV support group, Izikere (meaning 'Hope'), in Musanze, Rwanda. This group of 21 women and four men, all of whom are living with or affected by HIV, makes Christmas and greeting cards which are sold at Quaker meeting houses in Oxford, Cardiff and Colthouse (in the Lake District). In 2014/15, a total of £812 was raised, about half of which will be used to pay for the health insurance policies of the members of the group. Izikere is mentored and supported by a Quaker NGO, Healing and Rebuilding our Communities (HROC), which receives financial

support from Oxford Quaker Meeting. SFHT also raised £1,041 for HROC itself during the year. The SFH Trust transfers these funds to HROC and also claims GiftAid on their behalf from the UK government.

6. GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Strategies for Hope Trust was registered as a not-for-profit company limited by guarantee in June 2003, and as a charity in May 2008.

• The current trustees of the Trust are James Rowland, Peter Stalker, Wendy Tyndale, John Whitley and Rev Canon Tony Williamson.

- O Alison and Glen Williams manage the activities of the SFH Trust as Office and Production Manager and Series Editor, respectively.
- The SFH Advisory Group consists of Rev Dr Anne Bayley, Rev Renate Cochrane, Dr V. Chandra Mouli and Sr Lynn Walker.
- Our marketing intern during 2014/15 has been Susan Head, an MA student of Publishing Media at Oxford Brookes University. She has done an excellent job.
- Trish Attwooll has continued as a part-time Marketing Associate, with special responsibility for managing the distribution of SFH materials in francophone countries.

7. FINANCE

7.1 Project income and expenditure

Called to Care Phase 7 is a two-year project, and although there was a deficit at 31/3/15, this balance was redressed by income committed to the project which was received in April-June 2015.

² The negative expenditure in Marketing and Distribution results from charging-out postage and packing to other projects, which in March 2015 happened before invoices from our distributors were received. This balance will be reversed in 2015/16.

- O Expenditure on Called to Care Phase 7 began on 1/4/14, with an opening balance of £12,153, which was received in advance in 2013/14 from Hilfe fur Brüder and Zentrum Oekumene
- O Called to Care book 10 in French (*Être parent: un voyage d'amour*) was an unexpected bonus, where the World Council of Churches in Geneva offered SFHT £10,000 to produce this edition.
- O Partners in Africa: the closing balance of £2,607 was to be sent to FOCAGIFO (Uganda), HROC (Rwanda) and Izikere (Rwanda) early in the year 2015/16.
- O Marketing and Distribution: there is a negative expenditure figure here which is temporary, and due to transfers to other budgets of costs incurred in postage and packing at our distributors.
- Adjustments: in the year 2013/14 the accountants moved £60 income from Marketing and Distribution to Stepping Stones because it concerned some postage and packing of *Stepping Stones* original manuals. However, the only ongoing Stepping Stones project at the time (as now) was Stepping Stones for Peace and Prosperity, and so this move made the balance carried forward for Stepping Stones for Peace and Prosperity £60 larger than it actually should have been. To correct this, the accountants have this year reduced Stepping Stones income by £60. However, we wish to keep the actual income figure intact, and for this reason, we have created an extra line in both restricted and unrestricted income, in order to arrive at the same totals as our accountants.
- O Governance costs: a heavy deficit brought forward from the previous year was of necessity paid off by using income from sales this had to come from unrestricted funding. Most governance costs are for paying professional accountancy fees, and as from 2014/15 we are able to pay most of these from restricted funding budgets, where we have included a budget item for such expenses.

- O For Called to Care, we were very pleased to learn that extra funding was committed (though not received by 31/3/15), which will enable us to increase the two-year budget for Phase 7 from £94,592 to approximately £107,000. This will be reflected in the accounts for 2015/16.
- O Stepping Stones for Peace and Prosperity was completed during the year, with a change in donors. The outstanding payment of £5,838 from NESSA in Uganda was cancelled, and instead the Salamander Trust kindly gave SFHT £6,040 to complete the project.

7.3 Annual accounts and reporting

As a company with a turnover of less than £5 million, we are exempt from having our accounts audited. However, our professional accountants, Chapman Worth Limited, have, in addition to their financial report which complies with charity regulations, provided Strategies for Hope with an Independent Examiner's Report for the financial year to 31 March 2015. The financial report also contains our Trustees' Annual Report for the Charity Commission. (The accountant's report is attached at the end of this document.) In addition, we file separate Annual Returns to the Charity Commission and to Companies House.

7.4 Audit on Called to Care project

An audit on the Called to Care project, in the form of a Reasonable Assurance Report, was carried out on Called to Care accounts to March 2012. A further such report was scheduled for Called to Care finances to cover the period from April 2012 to March 2014. However, with the extension of Called to Care (Phase 7) until March 2016, our donors have agreed that this Reasonable Assurance Report will be postponed to coincide with the end of the project (March 2016).

7.5 Total income and expenditure since 2003

Table 7c below shows total income and expenditure by the Strategies for Hope Trust since it was registered as a not-for-profit company in June 2003.

8. MONITORING

Users of Called to Care materials are asked to submit feedback reports on how the materials have been used, and how members of churches, faith-based organisations and community groups have responded to them. These reports help the project management to monitor the use and impact of the materials. During 2014/15 most of the feedback received on SFH materials was in relation to the Called to Care workbooks. The following quotes have been excerpted from reports received on Called to Care workbooks 1 – 10:

CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 1, POSITIVE VOICES

The material is very ideal to use for promoting positive living. Many HIV-related deaths being experienced are due to denial or self-stigma. Most HIV-positive people do not accept their status. Those who accept it do not disclose to others and do not adhere to positive living guidelines. (Emmanuel Chila Sichone, Hope for Africa International, Kasama, Zambia)



As a Catholic, I am so impressed by the testimony of Rev Sister Leonora Torach in Uganda, who has let me

know that it is important that all Catholic pastoral carers (clergy and lay people) know and act with the belief that, whether or not they are infected with HIV, they are affected by their family members and friends who are living with HIV, and all are called to come out and fight the stigma, shame, denial, prejudice, ignorance and myths associated with the virus. (Lum Emerencia, participant in training workshop run by Amungwa Athanasius Nche, Sustainable Health and Development Effort Group, Bamenda, Cameroon)

We used to think that AIDS was a death sentence, but this book has helped us understand that anyone can get it. When religious leaders declare their HIV-positive status, it helps us to realise that AIDS is not a curse from God, and we should not judge those who are positive. (Samson Guloba, BUWEDDA, Jinja, Uganda)

CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 2, MAKING IT HAPPEN

Planning is very vital in all you are doing. Asking why you are going to do something is also very important. (Alfonse Bwambale, Alpha Children Ministry, Kasese, Uganda)

My community has found this to be a good book for the planning of future training since it points out ways of setting objectives in developing community work plan activities, in partnership implementation and monitoring impact. (Ongom Rufino, AGAM Development Association, Lira, Uganda)

The topics covered by this manual will help our group to start some small projects. (Akakpo Agossou, Action Communautaire pour l'Appui au Développement au Togo, Tsévié, Togo)





CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 3, TIME TO TALK

This book has opened our eyes. We used to think that talking about sex in the church was unacceptable, so this book is a very good beginning for the growth of our spiritual and physical life as Christians. (Pastor Brown Mtekela Mkandawire, Rural Education Support and Rehabilitation Unit, Blantyre, Malawi)

Our future plans are to do more Called to Care trainings with Muslim communities in other places, so that a lot more people get the information. (Sheikh Ramadhan Khalid, Machinga Mosque, Machinga, Malawi)

CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 4, PASTORAL ACTION ON HIV AND AIDS

The book is really provoking, inspiring, challenging and moving. It is self-explanatory and in simple English, so easy to read. (Caren Odero Owiti, NYAKWEFNET, Sondu, Kenya)





CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 5, COMMUNITY ACTION ON HIV AND AIDS

The participants commented that women and girls are more vulnerable to HIV and AIDS. They stressed that this is so because women and girls are not working or fishing, but most men do and this is causing men to have power over women and girls, and their vulnerability increases. (Father Jones D. Zowani, Anglican Church, Likoma Island, Malawi)

CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 6, THE CHILD WITHIN

It is so good for parents to spend time with their children, and some have started to do that, and to tell stories to their children and build their relationship. (Alfonse Bwambale, Alpha Children Ministry, Kasese, Uganda)

This book contains a lot of skills, and has made a great change to those who have had a chance to go through it. All the workshop participants testified that the book has changed their lives, and they will share what



they have learned with friends in their community. We ask for more copies of this book. (Samwel Okumu, Karungu Home Bay Development Group, Homa Bay, Kenya)

CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 7, CALL TO ME

We use our Bibles daily, but we did not understand and study them in order to respond to the HIV/AIDS pandemic. Now we are equipped with relevant knowledge and skills, and we shall organise Bible study sessions to train others. (Apostle Stephano Phiri, Hope Children Centre, Blantyre, Malawi)

People found the book challenging and thoughtprovoking, but also very helpful. They decided

to put into practice what they had discussed. (Sr Cecilia Mukazi, St Joseph Mission Hospital, Mutare, Zimbabwe)



After studying the chapter 'God's Justice' in this book, I have stopped condemning those people who are living with HIV, and judging them harshly. I will promote attitudes of compassion rather than being judgemental. (participant in workshop run by the Hope Children Centre, Blantyre, Malawi)

There is a radio station in Plumtree where a group of women in a Listeners Club have read out information form 'Call to Me' and 'Parenting – a Journey of Love'. They have also used the books to teach Sunday School children. (Lizwelethu Tshuma, DP Foundation, Bulawayo, Zimbabwe)

I came to this meeting without knowing much about the topic. I'm going home feeling I've been educated. ... This workshop has opened my eyes to how to use the Bible in the context of HIV. I feel empowered. ... I had some vague ideas about HIV, but now I feel that I know the subject in detail. ... The Bible studies have really made an impression on me. I didn't realize that these Biblical texts could be applied to the topic of HIV. (Students at the Faculty of Evangelical Theology, Yaoundé, Cameroon)

I enjoyed the group discussions. Everyone was able to participate. I learned that everyone – including people living with HIV – is loved by God. Therefore we must accept and love them, just like other members of our church. Also, we should talk about sex and sexuality in our churches. I shall encourage people to participate in discussions. (Antoine Banibeya, Êglise pentécôtiste Peuple Apart, Tsévié, Togo)

CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 8, MY LIFE – STARTING NOW

Many parents in this part of the world are not concerned with their children's upbringing, so this book is an eye opener to parents that will help them with skills for raising their children. One parent said: "I am a father of five children and I never thought that I had a responsibility to assist my wife in teaching good manners to our children. I would just shout at my wife for



failing to control the behaviour of our children. But with this training I am now equipped to work hand-in-hand with my wife to raise our children." (Rev Raphael Grant Juttah, Kanengo parish, Kanengo, Lilongwe, Malawi)

When I used this book with children, I found that the way many parents name their children indicates that there is a problem in the homes. The parents give them names like "Ocotoko", meaning "a dog is better than you", or "Buni", meaning "born for the grave". A young girl said that her mother always insults her by saying she has legs like a duck. But this book is a good tool for helping young people build their self-esteem. (Joshua Anguyo, Scripture Union, Arua, Uganda)

We plan to conduct more of these training workshops, especially in schools and community centres in order to reach out to more youth who might be at risk of alcohol and drug use, which often results in contracting HIV as they cannot make right decisions under the influence of such stimulants and intoxicants. (Tony Khanyepa, Youth Activists Initiative Organisation, Blantyre, Malawi)



CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 9, MORE AND BETTER FOOD

We need to network to see how a popular version in the local language could be produced to enhance farmer-to-farmer and farmer family learning for sustainability. (Harriet Nakasi, Caritas, Kampala, Uganda)

I am quite amazed by the material that Strategies for Hope is producing, which is very much aligned to dealing with HIV issues.

I happen to be working with women farmers in Umguza District of Matabeleland in Zimbabwe, 40% of whom are HIV-positive. I use the Called to Care book More and Better Food to improve their farming methods in the light of climate change. HIV-infected people need good food, and this book teaches them how to produce enough quality food. (Lizwelethu Tshuma, DP Foundation, Bulawayo, Zimbabwe)



CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOK NO. 10, PARENTING: A JOURNEY OF LOVE

The messages in the book are relevant and correct for current and future generations. They should be spread more widely for many more people to understand and act upon. (Peter Thembo, Kisinga ICT and Skills Development Centre, Kasese, Uganda)

Parents enjoyed using the book. It helped many parents who find talking with their children about sex and sexual behaviour very difficult. It also helped them to get more information about HIV. (Fr Samuel Kayus, Anglican Church of Tanzania, Tarime, Tanzania)



A Called to Care training workshop organised by the Zimbabwe Council of Churches and the Methodist Church of Zimbabwe. Participants at such workshops receive their own copy of the workbook used, and an attendance certificate.

The group decided to share the information with neighbours, fellow church members and relatives. Also to meet regularly and exchange ideas and views, and to introduce new friends. (Francis Wairegi, SARDI, Thika, Kenya)

This book is good for creating awareness about sex and letting parents know that it is important for children to know about sex so they do not get their information from wrong sources. (Joshua Anguyo, Scripture Union Uganda, Arua, Uganda)

CALLED TO CARE WORKBOOKS IN GENERAL

Called to Care books have inspired many of our members who had lost hope in life. They had felt abandoned and were not willing to give life a second chance. But after sharing the contents of these books, a glimmer of hope has shone into their lives, and they are once again vibrant and are the community champions. (Duncan Zebby Arunda, Child Health Project, Rongo, Kenya)

The Called to Care books are loved very much when they are used in our workshops, seminars and trainings. Teaching each other is a responsibility of each member of the community. Let's encourage each other and come together to get rid of this tragedy. (Fr Theobald Mwaniswa, Catholic Church/Somamemba Foundation, Mbeya, Tanzania).

9. FUTURE OF STRATEGIES FOR HOPE

The founders and co-managers of the Strategies for Hope project, Glen and Alison Williams, will retire in late 2015. In agreement with the trustees, the Strategies for Hope Trust will therefore:

- (a) cease distribution of all hard copies of Called to Care materials at the end of September 2015
- (b) make all Called to Care workbooks and SFH videos freely accessible from the SFH Trust website by 1 October 2015
- (c) account for all grants for the Called to Care project, and most other projects, by 31 March 2016.

In addition, Glen and Alison Williams will:

- (d) continue maintaining the Strategies for Hope website, on a voluntary basis, until at least 31 December 2016
- (e) provide technical and administrative support to organisations wishing to organised Called to Care training workshops or to produce editions of Called to Care materials in languages other than English until 31 December 2016
- (f) continue to mobilise financial and practical support to the FOCAGIFO Hope Institute in Uganda and to the HROC and Izikere projects in Rwanda.

10. THE WIDER PICTURE

There have been many important developments in the global HIV epidemic since December 1989, when the first three Strategies for Hope case study booklets were published. The most dramatic development has been the rapidly growing availability of antiretroviral drugs (ARVs) since 1995. The number of people taking ARVs has increased from 1 million in 2001 to 15 million in 2014. Not only do ARVs enable people with HIV to live longer, near-normal lives, but they also have the effect of dramatically reducing HIV transmission.

Globally, the number of new HIV infections has fallen from 3 million per year in 2001 to 2 million in 2014. AIDS-related deaths have fallen from 2 million per year in 2004 to 1.2 million in 2014. The life expectancy of a person living with HIV has increased from 36 additional years in 2001 to 55 additional years in 2014.

However, 35 million people worldwide are currently living with HIV, of whom 19 million are unaware of their HIV-positive status and are therefore less likely to take measures to avoid transferring HIV to others. Moreover, according to UNAIDS, HIV prevention programmes are being held back by "widespread stigma and discrimination, punitive legal environments, barriers to civil society engagement and lack of investment in tailored programmes".

It is precisely in the areas of reducing stigma and discrimination and promoting civil society engagement in addressing the challenges of the HIV epidemic that faith communities - as well as faithbased and community-based organisations - have extremely important roles to play. From its inception, the Strategies for Hope Trust has produced information and training materials, based on real-life experiences, which promote and inform the involvement

of churches, faith-based organisations, community groups and organisations of people living with HIV in responding to the huge challenges of the HIV epidemic.

It is disconcerting to note that, at least in the UK, international faith-based organisations are steadily reducing their commitments to HIV prevention, care and support programmes. And in sub-Saharan Africa, local NGOs, churches, faith communities and faith-based organisations are finding it increasingly difficult to access funding for their HIV prevention, care and support work.

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TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2015.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

Strategies For Hope Trust (SFHT) is a company limited by guarantee as well as a charity. The governing documents are the charity's Articles of Association (dated June 2003, and amended July 2012 to incorporate the Memorandum of Association) and a Special Resolution of August 2007 concerning rotation of trustees.

The Trustees, who are also the directors for the purpose of company law, and who served during the year were:

Appointment of new trustees is based on knowledge and suitability, and confirmed at special or annual general meetings; they serve a five-year term after which they may be re-elected.

SFHT has a board of trustees and the charity is managed on a day to day basis by two consultants - the Series Editor and the Office/Production Manager. There is also a fluid group of specialist advisors, a student intern who assists once a week in the office, and a self-employed associate who helps with marketing in French, working one and a half days a week.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the company are the promotion of education and the protection and preservation of health, in particular by:

- a) supporting informed, effective, community-based responses to the main health and development problems affecting deprived and marginalised sections of society worldwide;
- b) producing and disseminating print, audiovisual and electronic materials designed to strengthen the capacity of communities, government services and primary health care and development workers to respond effectively to major health and development problems such as HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria, sexually transmitted infections, malnutrition, and maternal and child health;
- c) strengthening the capacity of organisations in developing countries to produce and disseminate such materials, and helping to create a policy environment favourable to community-based health and development initiatives.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

Public Benefit Statement

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities they should undertake.

During the year, the Strategies for Hope Trust has carried out its duty with regard to the objectives of the charity and to public benefit, by producing and distributing books and videos, mainly free to organisations in sub-Saharan Africa and by facilitating training workshops for use of Called to Care workbooks in sub-Saharan Africa. Full details are in the charity's Annual Review 2014-2015.

Achievements and performance

- 1. Distribution by the charity and its partners overseas of 17,173 copies of books and videos, 60% to organisations and individuals in sub-Saharan Africa, and 35% to organisations in Asia. Usually distribution is around 90% to sub-Saharan Africa, but production in Burma and Nepal of 6,000 Called to Care books altered the ratio this year.
- 2. Production of Called to Care handbook no 10 in French, 2,000 copies to be printed in April 2015.
- 3. Organisation and facilitation of a further 22 Called to Care training workshops in nine African Countries (Cameroon, Democratic Republic of Congo, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Rwanda, Togo, Zambia and Zimbabwe). These trained a total of 308 clergy, lay church leaders and community leaders to use Called to Care workbooks effectively in their communities. In addition, five partner organisations in Kenya, Malawi and Zambia organised 43 workshops, training 769 people, with funding received directly from donors.
- 4. Dissemination of the Users' Guide for Called to Care workshops to all organisations expressing an interest in running a workshop.
- 5.Ongoing distribution of Stepping Stones training materials, in collaboration with The Salamander Trust, which facilitates the implementation of Stepping Stones and provides an active website and networking programme for users. Editing and production of Stepping Stones for Peace and Prosperity for use in the Karamojong area of Uganda.
- 6. Production of Called to Care no 7 in Burmese (1,000 copies), in collaboration with Myanmar Catholic HIV/ AIDS Network, and production of Called to Care in Nepalese numbers 8 (2,000 copies) and 10 (3,000 copies) in collaboration with Sakriya Sath in Nepal.
- 7. Books reprinted: 10.325. Films duplicated: 130.
- 8. Ongoing partnership with many organisations in Africa which have made an invaluable contribution to the dissemination and implementation of our materials, by distribution, training and facilitating workshops.
- 9. Ongoing marketing and distribution.
- 10. Monitoring and evaluation: continued correspondence and distribution of feedback forms, mainly by email.
- 11. Updating and maintenance of website, with information and news stories on our partners in Africa, as well as full information on our resources and clips from all our DVDs.

Financial review

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in Note 1 to the accounts. The trust is managed on a project basis, with minimal overheads, and expenditure is not authorised before funding has been secured.

Funds brought forward at the beginning of the year totalled £25,899. Income for the year was £82,416, and expenditure was £92,056, leaving a balance to carry forward of £16,259. Of this £7,616 is restricted funding, and £8,643 is unrestricted.

Restricted funding, received and committed, for the year 2015/16 includes approximately: £27,500 for Called to Care Phase 7; £7,900 for Called to Care book 10 in French; £2,610 for partners in Africa; £80 for the Angélique DVD.

Further income and expenditure details are in the attached financial statements, and a full statement of activities can be found in the charity's Annual Review 2014-2015.

Plans for the future

Planned activities for 2015/16 include:

- Reduction in activities with a view to running the charity in future with less funding and more emphasis on the website. Planned changeover by end of September 2015.
- Called to Care: continued free distribution of all 10 titles in English and the existing titles in French (5), Swahili (5), and Portuguese (3); training for users and facilitators; negotiating with partners overseas for the production of titles not yet translated into French, Swahili, Portuguese and African languages.
- Stepping Stones: handing over all ownership and management and copyright of Stepping Stones materials to the Salamander Trust, with which we have always collaborated on Stepping Stones materials and implementation.
- . What Can I Do: continued, but limited, free distribution of DVDs and Facilitators Guides.
- Ongoing marketing and distribution of books and films, with our standard practice of making materials available free of charge to organisations in sub-Saharan Africa that cannot afford to buy them.
- Increased website updating, with promotion of partners' experiences of using Strategies for Hope materials, and guidance for training in Called to Care workshops.
- Other ongoing activities: correspondence with partners and users of materials, monitoring and evaluation.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

No material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt about the ability of the company to continue as a going concern have been identified by the trustees. On this basis the accounts have been prepared on the going concern basis.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming resources

Donations, legacies and other forms of voluntary income are recognised as incoming resources when receivable, except insofar as they are incapable of financial measurement.

1.3 Resources expended

Charitable activities include expenditure associated with promoting education, and the protection and preservation of health by:

- a) supporting community based responses to health and development problems affecting deprived and marginalised sections of society world-wide
- b) producing and disseminating printed and audio-visual material designed to enable effective responses to major health and development problems
- c) Strengthening the capacity of organisations in developing countries to produce and disseminate such materials.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets. They are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

1.5 Funds

Unrestricted funds - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds - these are funds that can only be used for a particular restricted purpose within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for a particular purpose.
